



## **Cornell Club of Greater Buffalo Book Prize**

The competition is open to all eleventh grade high school students in the greater Buffalo area. The Cornell Club believes that participation in this contest will aid students in the development of their critical thinking and writing skills. Development of these skills is vital to the maturity of a well-rounded life-long learner and will make one a much more attractive applicant during the college admissions process.

The first prize will consist of a certificate, a letter of award and a limited edition copy of Cornell University's Reading Initiative book of the year, *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?* by Philip K. Dick and \$100. Second, and third prizes, as well as honorable mentions consist of the book, certificate and letter, but no cash prize. There will be one first prize awarded, and as many second prizes honorable mentions as the Club sees fit.

The Cornell Club of Buffalo offers the prize; winning or placing favorably in the essay contest in no way implies a favorable admission decision by any of Cornell's seven undergraduate colleges.

### **Background**

One of the most important skills that you will continue to develop during the balance of your high school years and in college is the ability to thoughtfully evaluate opposing viewpoints - in other words, to think critically. This skill is important not only for students and scholars, but also for nearly every occupation you might choose, as well as for your personal mental growth and maturity.

### **The Rules:**

1. The contest is open to any High School Junior at any public or private High School as well as home-schooled students in their penultimate year of schooling in the Western New York or Southern Ontario region.

2. Answer the prompt below as completely as you can in 1000 words or less.
3. There are no limits to the range of your response, but it should give a picture of your personality and beliefs, and should imaginatively include your own life experiences including, but not necessarily limited to: reading, school, travel, work, personal successes, personal failures, sense of humor, current events, family history, etc.
4. If you refer to another author's work in a manner that would require citation, you may include footnotes or end-notes in any commonly accepted format. These citations will not count toward your 1000 word limit.
5. Finally, on the last page of the document include:
  - a. Your name
  - b. Your parents' or guardians' names
  - c. Your home address, telephone number, and e-mail address where we may contact you
  - d. The name of your school
  - e. The name of your English teacher with his/her school phone number
6. Please **do not** include any identifying information (your name, your teacher's name, etc.) on any page other than the last page.
7. All entries must be in Microsoft Word format or text format.
8. Submit your essay as a **single email attachment** to the following email address: [c.sasiadek@gmail.com](mailto:c.sasiadek@gmail.com) with the subject line "Cornell Club Essay Competition."
9. It is not a violation of the rules for submitted essays to receive academic credit.

## **PROMPT:**

**Due to the increasingly rapid pace of technological change, society often has difficulty reconciling new technologies into existing systems of morals and ethics. There are currently several fields where there is widespread public debate over new technologies, including:**

- \* New technologies that enable governments and non-governmental entities to surveil citizens**
- \* Human cloning**
- \* End-of-life medical technologies**
- \* Bio-engineering**

**A major research institution such as Cornell has a large role in developing new technologies and also in shaping the public debate surrounding them. Choose a technology that presents a moral or ethical quandary (from the list or otherwise) and explore the societal repercussions of this technology from an ethical standpoint.**
